Key observations

- Overarching themes of food supply and security, globalisation, resource efficiency, waste reduction.
- It's not just supply and value delivery of benefits, social impacts
- More science and knowledge challenges getting bigger, more complex? Driving excellence?
- The changing nature of knowledge based economies significance of institutional behaviour in complex systems
- Redefining risks across sector what and where are the drivers how can we know/validate?
- Environmental services valuation, monetisation, benefit sharing
- Outcomes what is desirable public engagement, consumer responses?
- Values, investments and returns collecting and focusing, building durable partnerships

Strategic needs

- What is the bioeconomy? Clear objectives and measurable indicators; varied contexts and expectations – joining together the system
- Range of goods and services, both expansion and diversification, need quality definers, CSA etc
- Timelines/risk profiles for delivery, ownership, development of supply and value chains
- Supportive environments R&D, IP, trade, skills and human/organisational capacity – essential/desirable?
- Engagement in new economies rural/urban interactions, integrated resource systems, new perceptions of social value...
- Building networks recognising and promoting good practice... the vanished role of keystone reviews?
